#### Stewardship Campaign Update

Our 2020 Confirmation Class is CONFIRMATION starting next month! But don't worry, if you are or know a young one in at least





# Church Life

### 5 Minute Yoga

Are your bulbs emerging? Mine are, so now I am thinking of Spring. So, let's spring into our 5 minute yoga routine.

- Stand behind your chair and hold the back
   of the chair for balance. Come up onto your toes.
   Hold the position for a count of 4, then lower your
   heels. Repeat 10 times to wake up the calf muscles
   and loosen the ankle joints.
- Standing on the right side of the chair and hold on with your left hand. Lift the right knee and lower; do this movement a total of 10 times, then switch to the other side.
- Go back to the right side of the chair, and now swing your right leg forward and back. This will loosen the hip joint. After 10 swings, switch to the other side.
- Still standing behind the chair, stand on one foot, practicing balance. You may hold onto the chair for support, but if you feel secure, try balancingwithout holding onto the chair. Practice this a couple of times, then switch sides.
- Let's sit in the chair with both feet on the floor, knees bent. With an inhale, raise your arms overhead, reaching for the ceiling. With an exhale, lower the arms. Repeat this movement 10 times to loosen the shoulder joints.
- Finally, extend the arms in a T position. Actively reach your hands to the side walls. Hold for 2 breaths, then release the arms. Repeat this 10 times.

Take a moment to give thanks to God for this time of movement and intentional breathing. Andrea Davis and Mildred Dixon invite you to join our gentle yoga class each Thursday evening from 6 - 7PM. If you are new to yoga, know that we walk you through each pose and only ask that you work within your limitations. We hope to see you soon.



### **Condolences**



### Nan Gordon (10 Apr 1946 – 23 Dec 2019)

Nan was born in 1946 in Cleveland, Ohio. She and her brother John attended the Shaker Heights schools. Nan graduated from Westminster College in New Wilmington, PA and earned a master's degree in music education

from Duquesne University.

Having always had a love of US history particularly the colonial era, she relocated in 1970 to the Massachusetts South Shore, teaching in the Duxbury Public Schools for thirty two years. In the summer of 1971 she took a job as a program assistant at the Craigville Conference Center (now UCC) on Cape Cod. It was there she met the love of her life, Seth Gordon who was attending the Culinary Institute of America on the GI bill, and was cooking at the Craigville Inn for the summer. They were together nearly 34 years.

Retiring to Florida to escape the cold and be closer to Nan's parents, they had three years retirement in Citrus Springs prior to Seth's untimely death from cancer. During Nan's years of raising other people's children they never desired any of their own.

Nan began to do a lot of traveling at this time, and volunteered three times at McCurdy School in Espanola, New Mexico. It was there she heard of the Deaconess Home Missioner program from a fellow volunteer. This same volunteer arranged for her to be invited to a discernment event at Alma Matthews in New York. Once accepted for the 5 course core studies she began to discern what her calling would be (or, as a pastor recently said, "Where her deepest joy met the world's deepest hunger").

She relocated to Gainesville which she had learned was home to one of the groundbreaking programs in Arts in Medicine. She was mentored by outstanding artists in writing, drama, visual arts and music. One of them referred her to a domiciliary for homeless veterans just about to open. With a "Cutting Edge Ministries Grant" from United Methodist Women she equipped a music studio within the facility, solicited donations of gently used folk instruments and instructional materials, and "Fret4vets" began.

Nan was commissioned in 2010 at the UMW Assembly in St Louis and remained with these two programs for the next 8 years. On a visit, passing through Brooks-Howell on an errand in August of 2017, Nan felt the call to bring her gifts to Brooks-Howell. This

call was further validated when her mentor in Gainesville indicated an eagerness to take over Fret4vets as part of her responsibilities. Nan arrived at Brooks-Howell in January of 2018.

Nan shared her light, energy and love of music with everyone, be it guitar, singing, flute and/or piano. At Brooks-Howell she serenaded as "Piano Nan" in the front lobby, directed the choir for chapel services, and played in the recorder trio. She also shared her talents and laughter leading music with health center residents. She was also a member of Trinity United Methodist Church in Asheville and played with the Asheville Flute Choir. Her energy and love of life was an inspiration to all of us. At Nan's request, memorials may be given to Brooks Howell Home Activities Fund.

Dorothy "Dot" Owenby Parker, age 72, of Forest City, passed away Wednesday, January 15, 2020 at Spartanburg Regional Hospital.

### From the Simplified Structure Planning Workbook

Churches desiring to recruit and equip modern leaders will likely need to shift into the simplified, accountable leadership structure. This is often called a single-board model of governance (although using that terminology can be misleading), in which all the ongoing administrative and strategic functions of leadership are delegated to a **single executive team**. This structure is enabled by the 2016 UMC **Book of Discipline ¶ 247.2**. The duties and responsibilities of the traditional four administrative committees -- finance, personnel (Staff/Pastor Parish Relations), property (Trustees), and administrative board[Church Council] - can be combined into a single governing leadership team. This simplification of your structure allows a streamlined and clear line of accountable leadership:

- The governance responsibilities of fiduciary work (goal assessment, financial and facility oversight, and legal responsibilities), generative work (creativity, teambuilding, new questions), and strategic work (creating plans for the future) take priority in the lay leadership team's work.
- The management of the day-to-day church should be the responsibility of the pastor and staff (paid and unpaid).
- The laity of the church are equipped for ministry, both short-term teams and longer-term goals.

When leadership moves to the simplified, accountable leadership structure, the church begins to align all its resources to the congregation's mission and unique vision. Those resources include such things as time, energy, people, facility, budget, or calendar.

With a clearly stated purpose and trajectory (the "WHY"), decisions are made with the focus on the church's community mission field, and the congregation's resources (people, facility, and financial) are focused on the church's mission and disciple-making plan. In other words, [T]the strategic work of aligning our church, its members, and its resources toward its purpose of making disciples becomes the sole focus of the governing board.

Policies and guidelines are created to allow permission -giving to ministries and new ideas to ensure both congregational alignment and alignment with the

conference Trajectory. The policies and guiding principles of the congregation become the "traffic guard rails" for the church ministries, keeping the church on the road toward fulfilling its mission. Individual decisions by the board/council on every ministry are no longer required. Monthly presentation and long oral reports certainly are not required. Instead, permission-giving guidelines are provided so decisions are made easily with flexibility without the board/council micromanaging every decision. Whenever decisions are made, the governing board should be asking itself if a new policy or new guiding principle needs to be created.

Some [churches] seek this change in governance because the number of active members does not allow for filling all the disciplinary committees as separate entities. While a simplified structure may help to solve that dilemma, it should never be the ultimate purpose. Fewer people making decisions is not the goal, nor is a new governance architecture a silver bullet. The goal is, and should always be, creating vital congregations that make disciples of Jesus Christ, who make disciples equipped to transform lives, communities and the world. Changing the number of people around the leadership table without also changing the leadership culture and leadership behaviors will only result in an isolated and ineffective board.

Most often, the Leadership Team includes:


- 9-15 members.
- Members serve a three-year term. The Lay Leader and Lay Delegate are exempt from the three-year term.
- Those around the Leadership Council table may serve in the function of SPRC, Trustees & Finance when specific decisions are needed. In order to meet the maximum number of 9 people per SPRC or Trustees, not all members of the Leadership Council will serve as official SPRC or Trustees designated members but may serve in an advisory capacity. The Nominations Team will serve to help the Leadership Council determine which Council members will serve which specialized roles.
- Even though the re-structuring occurs, ministry teams are still needed and in place. Fewer people on the Board means more people are available to do ministry. Simplifying structure is the combining of the four administrative teams of the Council, Trustees, Finance and SPR Committees. The nurture, outreach, and witnessing ministries continue their disciplemaking work.

### **Trustees**



### **UMC Protocol for a Gracious Separation Update**

- I. The Protocol released on Jan 3, 2020, still has to be written into legislation and introduced to General Conference which begins on May 5 in Minneapolis, MN. General Conference delegates from all over the world will attend and this is the only body that can make official decisions for the UMC. FYI Bishops are not delegates. Delegates are voted upon in the year prior to a regularly scheduled General Conference (e.g., our WNCCUMC delegates were voted upon at Annual Conference 2019.).
- 2. The Protocol and pending legislative allows for a traditional branch of our Methodist Family Tree to separate, retaining their properties and assets. Congregations that stay remain in the UMC.
- 3. Should the Protocol be the approved plan at General Conference in May, local congregations have 4 years to determine whether or not to separate with the traditional branch. A vote would be required to separate. A vote is *not* required to stay within the UMC. TUMC's Church Council has said it would like to take a full year to discern where we are before making any decisions should the Protocol be passed.

### How does it work for stock gifts?

**Donating\*** appreciated stock held for at least one year can help a donor avoid costly capital gains taxes while supporting your church!

The United Methodist Foundation of Western North Carolina, Inc. will liquidate gifts of stock on the church's behalf at no cost, sending a check directly to the church in the full amount of the stock gift.

### How does it work for IRA gifts?

#### Donors who are:

- Age 70 1/2 or older
- Required to take a minimum distribution (RMD) from an IRA
- Not dependent on their IRA for income
- Desiring a reduction in their taxable income

Can instruct their IRA administrator to direct all or some of their required minimum distribution to your church.\*

The donor reduces their taxable income dollar-for-

dollar of the contribution (up to \$100,000) that goes directly to the church. It's a win-win!

If the proceeds from the sale of stock or a distribution from an IRA pass through the donor's hands, no matter how briefly, a taxable event will be triggered for them. Be sure the plan administrator (IRA) or broker (stock) sends the gift directly to the church.


