From Rev. Darryl Dayson

I've got a bright idea for outreach! Let us show our community and creation we care by giving out a few LED lightbulbs. Sound odd? Ok hear me out. Central to our faith is the desire to embody our love toward God and neighbor (including the land/animals). This embodiment declares that God made creation good, pleasing and delightful (Genesis 1-2), and that there is divine dignity found in all creation because of its Creator (Psalm 8).We are more than comfortable showing God our love, but at times it is difficult to show our neighbors we love them. Weather it be because we do not know how to or we do not know how it will be received.



So, why don't we show our love towards our community by helping them care for our mutual love, Creation. By giving out LED lightbulbs to our neighbors, which will reduce energy usage and thus reduce greenhouse gas emissions tenfold, we are providing a tangible embodiment of our faith that declares the goodness of creation and our place as caretakers of it. 
2018 Altar Flowers

Camp Connect

We've made it through one week of Camp Connect, a week-long service camp for kids going into 2nd Grade and up, and it was a wonderful success. We are offering this camp two more times: the weeks of July 9 and July 30. On Monday-Thursday we go out each day and serve with a different community organization. Then we go somewhere like the Waynesville Rec Center on Friday. The cost of the camp is \$25 per kid. Contact Andrew.

Camp Tekoa (day camp shuttle service)

Many kids from Trinity have gone to Camp Tekoa. They offer overnight and day camps throughout the summer. The issue with day camp is driving back and forth to Hendersonville every day. To help with that, the Trinity UMC van will take day campers to and from camp during the week of **Aug.** 6^{th} -10th. This is a free service (though we'd never turn down gas money), but we are only offering to drive. You'll have to register your child for camp that week by visiting <u>camptekoa.org</u>. <u>5 Minute Yoga ~ Happy Summer.</u>

Are you feeling the heat? Here is a cooling breath you may want to try.

I. Sit tall in a chair. Open your mouth slightly, placing the tip of the tongue at the back of your top front teeth. Inhale and notice the cool sensation as the air flows over the tongue. Exhale through



your nose, with your mouth closed. Repeat this breathing pattern until you feel a respite from the heat. 2. Sit up straight and tall with your feet on the floor, and knees bent. Place one hand on your abdomen. As you inhale, notice your belly expanding. As you exhale, gently pull the belly in toward the backbone. Repeat this breathing pattern for 6 more breaths. This is a gentle exercise for the abdomen. 3. Now, raise the shoulders toward your ears, then take them back, squeezing the shoulder blades together. Release. Repeat 5 more times to ease any tension in the shoulders. 4. Extend your arms out to your sides, about 45 degrees from the floor. Turn your arms out, so palms face forward. Then turn the arms in, so the palms face to the back wall. Repeat at least 5 more times to help open up the shoulders for better mobility. 5. Rest the back of your hands on your thighs, palms up. Gently make a fist with your hands, and hold the fist for a count of 5; release the fingers with an exhale. Continue this pattern 5 more times. Then shake your hands to release any tension. 6. Stretch your fingers out wide. Then let them relax. Repeat several times. 7. Finally, make circles with your wrists. Thank you for taking this time to positively impact your health and body.

<u>Trinity United Methodist Called Charge</u> <u>Conference - Church Council Meeting</u> Wednesday, June 13, 2018 ~ 6 – 7 PM

- Full minutes are available in the Church Office.
- District Superintendent Beth Crissman led the Charge Conference, circulated & discussed in detail the Clergy Compensation Reports for the new fiscal year 2018-2019 which outlines salary structure for Revs. Walton Dayson. (Copies of these reports are available in the office & received prior approval by SPRC & Finance.)
 - a. Rev. Walton's base salary beginning 7/1/18 -\$60,000 plus \$10,000 housing; \$7,252 for

Pension; \$11,888 for health benefits. The District will cover this increase through grants.

- b. Once Rev. Dayson becomes an Ordained Elder in June, his base salary as of July 1st will increase to \$42,000 plus \$6,290 for pension & \$12,383 for Health Benefits, with no housing allowance since he resides in Trinity's parsonage. With grants & supplements, this leaves only about \$300 to be provided by Trinity.
- c. Glenn Parham moved that the Council accept the salary increases proposed for both ministers. Maxine Schrader seconded the motion & it was approved & Charge Conference concluded.
- DS Crissman stated that Sacred Places, a national organization from PA, performed an economic impact study measuring our economic impact in West Asheville to be ~ \$1.2 million. This study will help TUMC with community engagement.
- 3. <u>Community Engagement</u> Summer Initiative was presented by Rev. Dayson (detailed on the front cover of the newsletter)
- <u>Trustee Updates</u> Thanks given to Paul Sprouse's work on both front & rear church steps; ad hoc committees for both building usage policy & our memorial garden are still working on their respective plans; Capital Campaign HVAC systems will begin installation on June 25th, beginning with Youth areas.
- 5. <u>Finance Updates</u> See page 11.
- 6. <u>Hospitality</u> Jazz Concert & "Picnic on the Porch" updates were given by Kay Cooke with proceeds of the Picnic going to the Capital Campaign.
- 7. <u>Children & Youth</u> In addition to what is detailed on the Children and Youth page, here are some items of note:
 - a. The children along with the youth will start a new tradition of having a Father's Day reception on the lawn after worship.
 - b. The UMYF will host a 5th Sunday Intergenerational breakfast on 7/29. Donations will be accepted. donations.
- 8. <u>Pastor's Report</u> Rev. Walton asked the Council's blessing to host a community concert by the interfaith group "Abraham Jam". The District agreed to underwrite the majority of costs for this concert, while Rev. Walton & Phillip will also work on a national grant. Phillip made a motion to host the group "Abraham Jam" & Caroline seconded the motion. It was approved by vote. The meeting adjourned at 7 PM.

A - **One Church** (the plan supported by the Council of Bishops) The primary meaning of this One Church plan is that it removes the language about human sexuality that was inserted in 1972. It honors the contextual differences across our world. > C - Connectional Conference - Much like the world Methodist Council, where currently we have the church in South Africa, fully inclusive, Costa Rica, Brazil, and others are end up with an umbrella underneath it with sort of three branches of church, traditionalists, centrists - this has 32 Constitutional amendments.

Apportionments - Part Two

Last month we shared about our General Conference apportionments and where they serve on our behalf. This month, we explore our Annual Conference and District apportionments serve. The Conference Apportionment Funds for 2018 have been calculated for each local church on the basis of the church's average "net expenses" for the years 2014, 2015, and 2016 as reflected in the annual reports from the churches and pastors. We would be glad to provide you with a printout of TUMC's specifics.

Here's how the total conference-specific (not general/national & international) giving is broken down:

Conference Apportioned Funds (\$1443 total) Conference Operating Costs

- District Operations Fund \$355 This fund has been redesigned after the determination of the Conference reduction from fifteen 15 districts to 8 districts. Based on the District Transition Team proposal, all financial activities of the districts, including all spending for district personnel & operations, is to be performed by the Conference Office of Treasury Services. Therefore, this fund now includes all district personnel salary & benefits (district superintendents, administrative assistants, & congregational vitality strategists) & district operations of the office (which is supported by an equal allocation to each district office).
- Conference Support & Administrative Fund \$570 Includes all administrative operations of the Conference Office. This includes all personnel costs (salary & benefits), staff expenses for travel, office operations, committee operations (as deemed required by the Book of Discipline), operations of the Episcopal office (not including personnel costs for the resident Bishop), operations of the Cabinet, expenses for professional fees such as legal, audit, etc. Further breakdown is shown in Schedule One of the annual budget.
- Equitable Compensation Fund \$21 Represents all monies provided as salary grants to local churches that are unable to provide total funding for a pastor in their appointment. It is designed to provide grants on a six month basis, but no one church will receive funding over longer than a threeyear period, during which funding is reduced each year.
- Incapacity Insurance Supplement \$71 Represents pension & clergy health benefits to those persons who have been granted medical leave, formerly known as incapacity leave. Our annual conference typically averages 30 persons on medical leave.

Conference Ministry

 Mission & Ministry \$415 This fund represents expenditures for various ministries & to constituent organizations within the bounds of our Conference, namely, Leadership Development, Campus Ministries, Camp Tekoa as a conference camp, conference Youth Ministries, Justice & Reconciliation (Ethnic Ministries), Congregational Development & Vitality, Mission & Disaster Response, and to our health & welfare organizations (Methodist Colleges, retirement homes, & Children's Home). Some of the programs which this fund provides include, but not limited to:

Grants to local church programs

- Resources for congregational vitality such as Plowpoint initiatives and Turnaround BootCamp
- ◊ Funding for start-up congregations and their pastors
- Operations of the Conference Resource Center & the Mission Response Center
- Operational funding for campus ministries for each public college/university in our bounds
- Vouth, disaster, mission and ethnic programs within the Conference
- Intentional Interim Ministry \$11 Support the WNCC's Intentional Interim Ministry, which provides churches experiencing unique transitions a specially trained interim pastor for a period of 1 to 2 years. This fund will enable the Bishop and Cabinet to provide a consistent salary for intentional interim ministers as they move throughout the conference.

District Apportioned Funds

Each church also gives to support their district. Here's how we support our **Blue Ridge District** with **\$241** total:

- District Missional Engagement \$78 Provides support for missional projects; encompasses the former Mission Society funds, but creates more room for funding for projects within the missional networks created in each of our 8 districts.
- District Benevolence Fund \$80 Provides support for benevolent causes within the district bounds; encompasses past funding, if determined to be continued, for organizations such as Methodist counseling centers, campus ministries, & ethnic ministries within the districts.
- District Congregational Vitality \$83 Provides support for congregations both those seeking to rebuild vitality in their churches & those just starting out.

These numbers (\$1443 + \$241) combined with our General Conference Apportioned Funds (shared in June's newsletter of \$845) total \$2529 per year for total apportionments.

The Ministry of Generosity

Financial Update from June 13th Church Council

At the end of April, expenses exceeded revenues by \$2,249.92. At the end of May, expenses exceeded revenues by \$9,570.57. Giving has dropped off. Trinity has 225 active congregation members, of which 110 have contributed this year; however only 52 units filled out a pledge commitment card. He is working to obtain more statistics. A bill in the amount of \$3,618 for new doors of the Education building will come due soon, and with tight finances we need to continue to be mindful of expenditures. Rev. Walton stated that we have received a District grant for a stewardship coach. Details are being worked out for his schedule of presentations.


