Children in Worship

Zoo



On **Thu.**, **Jun.** 18, our children are spending the night in the NC Zoo in Asheboro. The cost is \$75 plus spending money and is open to all kids ages 7 and up (though it's not really for older youth). We will leave on that afternoon and get dinner along the way. We will get an after-

hours tour of the zoo and then spend the night. The next day we'll stay to explore during regular hours and return late afternoon on the Jun. 19.

Camp Connect

Each summer Trinity UMC holds a week-long camp

for older elementary children to help teach the importance of serving our community. We are continuing that this year with Camp Connect. During the weeks of grades 2-6 will go out and work with various service organizations in the Asheville area, like Hearts with Hands, ABCCM, Children First CIS, and Eblen Charities. On Friday we'll go to the Waynesville Rec Center indoor water park and the awesome playground near the rec center. Cost for the week is \$25. Kids can sign up for both weeks, but first-time campers will get preference in the second week, to allow space for everyone to have a chance to participate.

Camp Connect Mini

For the younger kids we will have a smaller version of Camp Connect the week of June 29- July 2 (Monday -Thursday). This is for children age 4 through Third Grade. They will spend each day playing games, eating snacks, hearing stories, making crafts, and helping with service projects. The cost is \$5. Contact Andrew to register.

Youth Trip(s)

This summer we are offering the Youth trip two different times. One will be during the week of July 19, the other will be during the week of August 2. We are following our recent pattern of staying at a United Methodist College while we work, learn, and play in the surrounding communities. The trip is \$150/Youth and is open to everyone going into 6th-12th Grade. For now we're only letting youth sign up for one week, but as we get closer they can sign up for both if there's still space.



5 Minute Yoga

Are your bulbs emerging? Mine are, so now I am thinking of Spring. So, let's spring into our 5 minute yoga routine.


- Stand behind your chair and hold the back
 of the chair for balance. Come up onto your toes.
 Hold the position for a count of 4, then lower your
 heels. Repeat 10 times to wake up the calf muscles
 and loosen the ankle joints.
- Standing on the right side of the chair and hold on with your left hand. Lift the right knee and lower; do this movement a total of 10 times, then switch to the other side.
- Go back to the right side of the chair, and now swing your right leg forward and back. This will loosen the hip joint. After 10 swings, switch to the other side.
- Still standing behind the chair, stand on one foot, practicing balance. You may hold onto the chair for support, but if you feel secure, try balancingwithout holding onto the chair. Practice this a couple of times, then switch sides.
- Let's sit in the chair with both feet on the floor, knees bent. With an inhale, raise your arms overhead, reaching for the ceiling. With an exhale, lower the arms. Repeat this movement 10 times to loosen the shoulder joints.
- Finally, extend the arms in a T position. Actively reach your hands to the side walls. Hold for 2 breaths, then release the arms. Repeat this 10 times.

Take a moment to give thanks to God for this time of movement and intentional breathing. Andrea Davis and Mildred Dixon invite you to join our gentle yoga class each Thursday evening from 6 - 7PM. If you are new to yoga, know that we walk you through each pose and only ask that you work within your limitations. We hope to see you soon.



Mary Mann Class

The Mary Mann Class (also meets on the 1st floor, opposite end of the Fellowship Hall) follows Cokebury's Adult Bible Study Series. The spring theme is LIFE. Scripture includes Genesis 3:8-24 (Mar. 1), Matthew 26:36-46 (Mar. 8), Numbers 21:4-9 (Mar. 15), Matthew 4:1-11 (Mar. 22), 2 Kings 25:8-21 (Mar. 29). Suffering is a reality of life, and this unit takes us to five places in



Scripture where suffering is a dominant theme: an Old Testament garden story and a New Testament garden story, an Old Testament wilderness story and a New Testament wilderness story, and the exile of the people of Judah. We examine these stories, not to wallow in misery, but to understand them as context for hope and salvation. (The March Spiritual Practice is Fasting.)

March Worship Schedule:

Mar. I ~ LENT I / Holy Communion

Matthew 4:1-11 (Jesus resists temptation in the wilderness)

Genesis 2:15-17, 3:1-7 (Adam and Eve eat from the tree of knowledge)

Much of who we are is shaped by the wilderness. Made in the image of God, Adam and Eve discover how easy it is to get stuck in human brokenness. Jesus finds his sense of call in the wilderness, as his ministry becomes defined by what he resists: hunger (feeding the hungry) and power (finding power in servanthood).

Mar. 8 ~ LENT 2

John 3:1-17 (Nicodemus questions being born again) Psalm 121 ("I lift my eyes to the hills")

Sometimes the wilderness mystifies and scares us. Nicodemus comes to Jesus by night, desperate for concrete answers to swallow up his doubt. Instead, Jesus offers him poetry and mystery, pointing him to the wildness of the Spirit. The hymn of Psalm 121 reminds us of the power of song when trudging through difficult or perilous wilderness spaces. In the wilderness of seeking justice, our songs give us courage and strength to climb even the highest of hills.

Mar. 15 ~ LENT 3

(The Rev. Vernon Robinson, preacher)

John 4:5-42 (The Samaritan woman at the well)

Exodus 17:1-7 (The Israelites thirst in the wilderness)

The Israelites experience the full spectrum of emotions the wilderness incites—doubt and disillusionment, disorientation and disconnection. Memories of their liberation fade as their thirst deepens and they ask, "Is the Lord among us or not?" In John's gospel, Jesus greets a woman of Samaria—a foreign land Jesus chooses to go through, not around—and transforms her personal wilderness into living waters.

Mar. 22 ~ LENT 4

(The Rev. Rob Parsons, preacher)

John 9:1-4 (Jesus heals a man born blind)

Psalm 23 ("The Lord is my shepherd")

Healing is a wilderness journey. The story of the man born blind shows us that sometimes we get worse before we get better, as his healing journey requires mud across his eyes and plunging into a pool he is forbidden to touch. In the familiar words of Psalm 23, we find comfort in God's loving guidance even through the valley of the shadow of death.

Mar. 29 ~ LENT 5

John 11:1-45 (Jesus raises Lazarus from the dead) Ezekiel 37:1-14 (The valley of dry bones)

Feeling stuck or depressed, navigating a failing marriage or working a job you hate, living with illness or chronic pain - these are all valleys of dry bones. In these spaces, we pray for God's breath to rattle us toward becoming whole. The story of Lazarus reminds us of the wilderness of grief, as Martha's response to her brother's death captures the way we, too, might protest death, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died."

Committee News

Church Council

Church Council met Sun., Feb. 23 to discuss and learn more about:

- The Single Board Leadership Team/ One Board Model with a presentation/ Q&A with the Rev. Rob Parsons, Blue Ridge District Vitality Associate. Council members plan to meet with Sunday Schools to share more information and receive questions about this model which would include 9-15 members and potentially combine Council, Trustees, Finance & Staff Parish into one Leadership Team. (Please see more details below)
- Approval of our 2020 Budget From the Simplified Structure Planning Workbook.

A <u>single executive team</u> structure is enabled by the 2016 UMC **Book of Discipline ¶ 247.2**. The duties and responsibilities of the traditional four administrative committees - finance, personnel (Staff/Pastor Parish Relations), property (Trustees), and administrative board (Church Council]) — can be combined into a single governing leadership team. This simplification of your structure allows a streamlined and clear line of accountable leadership:

- The governance responsibilities of fiduciary work (goal assessment, financial and facility oversight, and legal responsibilities), generative work (creativity, teambuilding, new questions), and strategic work (creating plans for the future) take priority in the lay leadership team's work.
- The management of the day-to-day church should be the responsibility of the pastor and staff (paid and unpaid).
- The laity of the church are equipped for ministry, both short-term teams and longer-term goals.

The strategic work of aligning our church, its members, and its resources toward its purpose of making disciples becomes the sole focus of the governing board. Monthly presentations and long oral reports certainly are not required. Instead, permission-giving guidelines are provided so decisions are made easily with flexibility without the board/council micromanaging every decision. Whenever decisions are made, the governing board should be asking itself if a new policy or new guiding principle needs to be created.

Most often, the Leadership Team includes:

- 9-15 members.
- Members serve a three-year term. The Lay Leader and Lay Delegate are exempt from the three-year term.
- Those around the Leadership Council table may serve in the function of SPRC, Trustees & Finance when specific decisions are needed. In order to meet the maximum number of 9 people per SPRC or Trustees, not all members of the Leadership Council will serve as official SPRC or Trustees designated members but may serve in an advisory capacity. The Nominations Team will serve to help the Leadership Council determine which Council members will serve which specialized roles.
- Even though the restructuring occurs, ministry teams are still needed and in place. Fewer people on the Board means more people are available to do ministry. Simplifying structure is the combining of the four administrative teams of the Council, Trustees, Finance and SPR Committees. The nurture, outreach, and witnessing ministries continue their disciple-making work.



Memorial Garden Update


