Our Money Story Bible Study will meet weekly in lanuary via Zoom or in person for up to 10 people in the Library on Sundays, 9:30-10:30AM, for 4 Sundays beginning January 10 - 31.

We all have a money story, whether we recognize it or not. Perhaps we are living from a story of fear or shame or guilt. Or a story that our actions won't have an impact. Or a story that we don't have enough. Where might God be speaking a new narrative into the limited ones we have told ourselves?

Often, to speak of money is to invite tension into the room. We so quickly want to avoid it. But we can reframe this. Money and possessions are one of the most common topics in scripture, and lesus talked about money more than faith and prayer.

Our money story, therefore, is a spiritual story for our own households and for our church family.

We will use a workbook and conversation to discern and share our money story. Our narratives around money, possessions and beliefs shape our actions. Ultimately, the hope is that our conversation & exercises will inspire us to give more faithfully of ourselves and our resources to bring forth God's money story of liberation and healing for all.

DECEMBER MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

The TLC last met on Tue., Dec. I, 6PM via Zoom and covered the following (our meeting minutes):

- Reflected on the questions Where have you seen God moving this week? Where have you seen God's heart breaking this week? Where have you seen God rejoicing this week?
- Reviewed Church Finances through October & part of November:
- ♦ We continue to hold steady in terms of income and expenses. We decided we are able to pay an additional month of apportionments, bringing us to being able to pay in 50% to our Conference and the General UMC this year. We are on track to end the year well, having kept expenses way below budget. Year-end statements to date will be sent out in December with the Advent Bags.
- The Pumpkin Patch proceeds allowed us to pay all our local missional budgeted commitments (ABCCM, WNC Rescue Mission, Meals on Wheels, Haywood Street, UNCA Wesley Foundation, and one of the UMC approved Advance Special funds) and some of the Conference & General UMC missional apportionments (e.g., almost all our District Missions funds & WNC Conference missional funds). In addition, we are grateful for the Mary Mann Class; missional efforts over \$4200 in additional missional giving! If we were to add in the monetary value of all the volunteer hours TUMC folks have given, this amount would be even bigger. Thank you SO much!
- We set a goal of \$5000 for the "Blended Traditions" Christmas collection (Angel Tree, Fuel Fund, Poinsettia giving).
- ♦ Our 2021 Stewardship Campaign, "Our Money Story," begins in January.
- We made note that giving through the on-line portal does cost the church a small bank fee. Because on-line giving has increased, so have the Vanco fees. We will work to encourage regular givers to use their banking "bill pay" or an app like Venmo to reduce these administrative costs to TUMC.
- We began working on a draft 2021 budget. We will be working hard to present a trim budget that hold our mission and ministry front and center around worship, discipleship of all ages & outreach. As we request households to turn in the "Estimate of

- Giving" cards during January 2021, the TLC will revisit the budget to finalize and present TUMC with as close to a balanced budget as possible.
- Received Missional updates about Blended Traditions Collection, Manna Distribution, RITI/ Red Roof Inn meal plans & Red Wagon (lots for December!)
- Received Worship & Discipleship updates including distribution of Advent Bags!
- Received Trustees updates, including completed tub repairs in the parsonage (partially under warranty); boiler/ radiator repair in Fellowship Hall is under review; updates on education building potential renters for next year the Avl Peak Academy public charter school; the Memorial Garden is still under construction; and that all our Covid-19 protocols for welcoming up to 50 people in the church buildings are going well.
