DEEP TIME

Deep Time continues to grow! Starting on **July 1**, Deep Time began in an official capacity. A staff has been put together, events to spread the word have been located, and huge steps are being made to get this new church start off the ground! We are launching a weekly Fresh Expressions community at the Buncombe County Sheriff's Office, and are in conversation about



weekly worship in the community. The large coffee roaster should be installed in the room behind the Boy Scout Room by mid-September, and persons impacted by incarceration will be hired shortly after. Deep Time's official launch as a Church and Social Enterprise is **Sun., Dec. 3, 2023**. We will have a launch event where we will be showcasing the roaster, pairing coffees with various foods, and dreaming of what Deep Time's impact might be at Trinity and beyond.

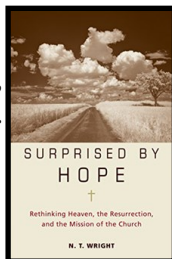
We are also currently exploring a ministry that will offer security for our grounds, relationship with those who spend time on the grounds, and accountability for what life together looks like at Trinity. This is in direct response to the feedback we have received regarding the presence of our unhoused siblings on Trinity's property. This ministry is called the "Kinship Collective" and it will consist of 18-24-year-olds that are justice impacted and are aspiring to be Community Health Workers.

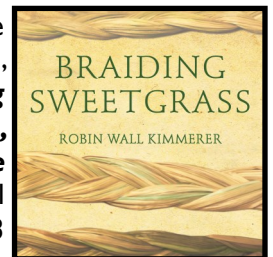
TUESDAY MORNING DEVOTIONS

STRATEGIC PLANNING UPDATE - AUG 12

The Strategic Planning team held a meeting on August 12, 2023 to finalize the priorities for the next few months. We agreed first to formalize our Mission, Vision, Values and Strategic Pillars to help guide our plans.

Why Do We Exist?

Mission: We exist to share the love of God, now and forever.

What Do We Do?

Vision: Trinity is a community that serves and grows in God's abundant grace as disciples of Jesus.

How Do We Behave?

Values: We value respectfulness, generosity and courage as we provide brave spaces and opportunities for everyone to gather, worship, engage and serve.

How Will We Succeed?

Strategic Pillars: We will succeed by:

Nurture: Becoming, caring for and engaging with our church family and community

Outreach: Providing compassionate service to local, regional and global communities

Worship: Developing, strengthening and sharing our Christian experience and faith

Stewardship: Ensuring the health and sustainability of the resources entrusted to us (people, building, finances)

Then we agreed on the process we would use for distilling a list of 35 ideas down into a critical few items that would be our strategic focus. Here is the process we used:

What is Most Important Right Now? (Distilling Process)

Identify Critical Few & Execution Plan:

- 35 Ideas (items) were captured from prior meetings & emails
- Placed all items on the Sticky Board under Strategic Pillars
- Had each person vote for their **top ten** items.
- Combined any items that make sense for simplification.
- Asked folks for lobbying comments in favor or against any items on list
- Continued to combine any items that make sense for simplification.
- Had each person vote for their **top six** items (Ignore Strategic Pillar Categories)
- Majority rules selected **top three** (critical few) to work on

Developed Execution Plan for top three items

- Identified Team members who will champion top

three items

- Defined what each action plan needs to include for the top three items:
 - ⇒ What needs to be done (Define high level action steps)
 - ⇒ What resources are needed to accomplish item (people, money, approval)
 - ⇒ When do actions need to be completed (timeline)
 - ⇒ How will we measure success? (Define completion)
- When an item is completed, we will start work on next item #4, then #5, then #6

What is Most Important Right Now? Top Three (Critical Few) Champions

#1 SECURITY

Mark Locklear & Eric Sands

- Improve Security to protect our assets and prevent vandalism with video cameras and lights.
- Install a Wrought Iron Fence around Memorial Garden and east side of sanctuary building
- Install fencing around Air Conditioner Units
- Hire part time security to monitor property after hours
- Impose strict No Trespassing Policy

#2 ENGAGE & CONNECT

Cathi Durham & Laszlo Bujdoso

- Common messages via a Communication Plan: Calendar, Newsletters, Bulletins, Webpage
- Engagement & Connecting with members and friends.
- Developing circles of care for our congregation.
- Nurturing Current Members & Friends by connecting with cards, visitation and small groups.
- Growth focus by nurturing current members and outreach to new potential members.

#3 CURRENT EVENTS FOCUS (and please see any of these folks to offer your help!)

- **Melanie Meador**—Have Fall Festival if there is sufficient support and participation.
- **Laurie Bujdoso**—Sunday Trinity Table once per month.
- **Dustin Mailman**—Wednesday Trinity Table as programs are identified.

CHARGE CONFERENCE

ANNUAL CONFERENCE REPORT

from Laurie Bujdoso

The 2023 Western North Carolina Annual Conference was a wonderful weekend filled with God's grace and the opportunity to connect with one another and with God. We joined at Lake Junaluska in June, with Pastors Nancy and Dustin, my husband, Laszlo, who served as the District at Large Delegate and myself as Trinity's Lay Delegate.

The opening hymn for Friday's business session was, "Are Ye Yet Alive?" I am here to report that the churches of the Western North Carolina Conference are indeed "Alive" and as portrayed by the United Methodist Foundation, "We are Here for Good!"

The following are some of the highlights from the Annual Conference:

1. Bishop Ken Carter presided over the Annual Conference with grace and compassion. He reminded us prior to deliberations and voting, that as Methodist we were expected to treat each other in a manner that would do no harm. And everyone handled all discussions in a very respectful manner.
2. There were sixteen (16) Emerging Community Pastors Commissioned by the bishop. These pastors will be engaged to plant United Methodist communities in places where churches have either disaffiliated or their church space has changed so much that they are trying to figure out the next chapter of church life together.
3. The conference recognized eighty-six (86) Lighthouse Congregation Churches, including us, TUMC! These Lighthouse Congregations are identified as a temporary resting place seeking to welcome anyone who has been displaced as a result of their church being closed or disaffiliated.
4. We celebrated a Duke Endowment grant of \$5.2 million being made available over the next five years to reinvest in areas of disaffiliation and with a commitment to serve abandoned members in these areas.
5. We committed ourselves as United Methodists to be



a Church that welcomes anyone and everyone: welcoming immigrants; reckoning with the realities of racism; developing a more strategic response to strengthen the Black church; honoring the faith of people with different political beliefs; and including LGBTQIA+ persons in all aspects of the life of our church.

6. There was a resolution identifying by name, five (5) United Methodist churches for closure. This was done as a prayerful remembrance of the many individuals that had been served by these churches over the years.
7. We heard witnesses and examples from individuals who are offering ministry through storytelling, hosting diversity conversations in rural contexts, and church planting in digital spaces attended by computer gamers and individuals who primarily engage each other online. (Ask Laszlo if you want more information on what this means.)
8. There was a service to ordain, commission, and license twenty-nine (29) individuals as clergy for ministry in local churches and extension ministries and commissioned a deaconess for ministry. The service concluded with an invitation to clergy to renew their vows of ordination, and a number of persons stepped forward to explore a call to ministry.
9. The conference passed two (2) Creation Care resolutions, which asked each church to make this ministry one of their priorities and urged our denomination to add fossil fuels to the filters for responsible investing.
10. We held an election to appoint three (3) new lay delegates to the 2024 Jurisdictional Conference to replace lay delegates who could no longer serve.
11. We learned that the Western North Carolina Conference will play a key role in co-hosting with the North Carolina Conference, the 2024 United Methodist General Conference. It will be held at the Charlotte Convention Center, April 23 - May 3. Volunteers are needed to help with hosting this major event. More information regarding how we can help will be coming in the next few months.
12. The bishop and all of the speakers communicated a consistent focus on grace, connection and holiness as our pathways to healing in the midst of a difficult season in our nation and in our communities.
13. During Annual Conference, an offering of almost \$50,000 was collected to help plant new churches in Ukraine and in areas of Europe where Ukrainians are living as refugees.
14. The conference approved the 2024 budget, including a 2% reduction in apportionments from local

churches. This reduction was a result of payments made by disaffiliating churches.

15. The bishop announced the appointment for our conference of pastors to the 757 churches and extension ministers to chaplaincy, campus ministry, community development, higher education, justice and mercy ministries, and missionary service. Also, the district superintendents were commissioned as missional strategists for the coming year.

Next year's Annual Conference will be held June 20-23 at Lake Junaluska. It was an honor to represent Trinity again this year. Ministry is happening every hour in our conference and it is exciting to be a part of a connectional network for growth and support.

DIANNE STANTON WARD

(06 AUG 1947 ~ 26 JUL 2023)



Pawleys Island, South Carolina - On Wednesday, July 26, 2023, Dianne Stanton Ward, passed away in her sleep at the age of 75.

Dianne was born on August 6, 1947, in York, SC to David and Evelyn (Nichols) Stanton. She graduated from Clover High School, and then went on to pursue multiple degrees in higher education. She received her BS in Physical Education from Coker College in 1968, followed by her EdD in Physical Education from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro in 1979, and finally her EdD in Physical Education from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro in 1979.

In 1969 she joined the faculty at Coker College as an instructor and assistant professor and remained there until 1975. (She also served on the Coker Board of Trustees from 1977 to 1979, and, at the time, was the youngest board member ever!) In 1975 she joined the faculty at the University of South Carolina where she would stay for over 23 years serving in many different roles and responsibilities including the Interim Dean for the School of Public Health from 1997 to 1998. It was here where she honed her craft as both an educator and researcher. USC was a very special place for Dianne where she made life-long friends and became a die-hard Gamecock fan.

In 1998 she took a huge personal and professional leap of faith when she left South Carolina to join the faculty at the University of North Carolina. This would become the most important and impactful move of her professional career. While at UNC, her work in the field of childhood nutrition and physical activity skyrocketed. Her research, and the programs that came out of this research, will continue to impact people, particularly children, for many years to come. Dianne loved her work and her wonderful staff at UNC so much that she never wanted to retire. She passed away while she was still doing the work that she loved with the people she loved. Although being an educator and researcher truly defined Dianne, she had many other layers. She was a very spiritual person who cared deeply about the environment. She was obsessed with birds and even kept a journal to log down all the species of birds that she

would see. She was an incredibly generous person who gave anything to anyone who needed it. Whether it was her time, money, friendship, or mentorship, Dianne was filled with compassion and a desire to help. She was a genuine person who had a warm smile and an infectious laugh. She loved books (especially good mysteries), entertaining, dancing, and going to the beach. Her dream was to have a beach house on Pawleys Island, which she was able to achieve before her untimely passing. Dianne was preceded in death by her parents, David and Evelyn Stanton, her brother, David Stanton Jr, and her beloved daughter Eliza Faris Ward. She is survived by her daughter, Johnna Massoni, (Mark), her sister, Leslie Couick (Steve), her niece, Shawn Stanton Carr (Chuck) and her three grandsons who were the absolute loves of her life: Micah Ward (19), Shiloh Ward (18), and Brady Massoni (16).

A Celebration of Life ceremony was held on Sat., Aug. 19 from 12PM to 3PM at Southern Charm Events, 534 Waterford Glen Way, Rock Hill, SC 29730. She was a lifetime member of Trinity United Methodist Church and was a member of the Mary Mann Sunday School class for over 60 years.

Her life is well summed up by one of her favorite scriptures, "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith."

A celebration of life service was held at 4PM, Sun., Aug. 20 at Trinity United Methodist Church, with her son Rev. Brian Davis, and Pastor Nancy Walton officiating. A receiving of friends will be held at 3:00 p.m before the service.
