WORSHIP

Here are the remainder of the stories (you voiced & we have woven together) that we'll be sharing on Sundays through Nov. 19:

- Nov. 12 - Stewardship Sunday #1 - Matthew 25:1-13 - The Parable of the Ten Bridesmaids - will be our focus for worship!

- Dec 3 - 1st Sunday in Advent, Holy Communion & Celebration of Deep Time's official start!
- Dec 3 - 24 - We'll also start with our Advent series, *From Generation to Generation*, taken from the line's of Mary's song in Luke's Gospel - "Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed; for the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is his name. His mercy is for those who fear him from generation to generation. (Luke 1: 48b-50)"

Despite the challenges and vulnerability she faced, Mary could glimpse the scale and scope of the good news she was part of bringing forth. This good news transcends time and space—it was and is bigger than just her. Christ is coming for collective liberation: God's redemption is at work for years to come. Therefore, the promise is meant to be lived out and passed on from generation to generation.

We are invited to look at the characters in our scriptures and wonder: What did each character pass on or contribute? How did each character participate in God's liberation and love? Which characters try to thwart God's justice and what can we learn from them? What is our role now? What is our generation's task? What will we carry forth, and what should we leave behind?

The root word of "generation" is "gen" meaning "origin" or "birth." Our theme is also a call to action: what are we being called to generate or bring forth? What have your ancestors and those who have come before you passed on for you to continue? Who are the spiritual elders in your community who planted the seeds for the things that are now blooming? What seeds are you planting for the future?

From Generation to Generation... reminds us of the ways our lives, histories, actions, and stories are interconnected and woven together. In the midst of narratives, policies, and rhetoric designed to divide us, what does it look like to practice belonging to one another? The work of God is always unfolding—in and through us. This Advent season, how will we carry it forth?

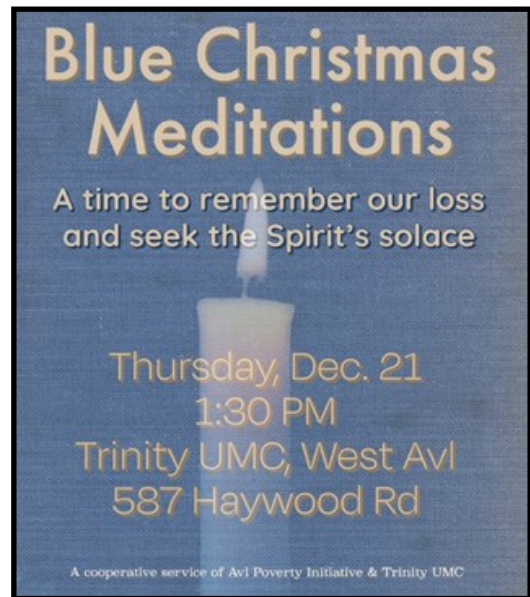

SAFE SHELTER UPDATES

Safe Shelter will begin around November 6, at the A-Hope Hospitality House, 19 N Ann Street, in downtown Asheville. We are grateful to be offered their 20 bed space to begin around November 6, with our partners at Grace Covenant Presbyterian and Grace Episcopal churches. Other churches are also coming on board to help!

Thanks to the hard work of our partners at Counterflow, we have received funding for a 12 month shelter space from Asheville City and Buncombe County governments. This allows us to follow last year's model, hiring a Director, Operations Manager, and Peer Support specialists to run the daily program, with plenty of ways for volunteers to lend a hand, including evening meals,

snacks, and donations of items as they arise. Our current donation list includes:

- large plastic bins for people to store belongings
- a washer/dryer combo or \$ to purchase a set
- bunk bed and/or folding cots.

If you have any of these items and would like to schedule a pick up, please contact Lee in the office. If you are able to drop them off at Trinity or A-Hope, please contact Nancy to schedule a time.

Once we are up and running, we plan to offer tours of the space for you to visit. PLEASE be in prayer for this incredible cooperative ministry, the new staff coming on board, and especially for the guests we will serve. Stay up to date by visiting, www.counterflowasheville.com/safeshelter.

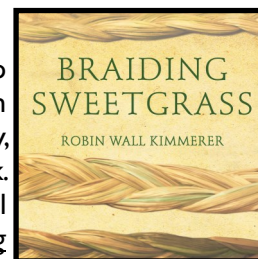

DISTRICT & CONFERENCE NEWS

ZOE EMPOWERS - RWANDA

As you may know, Rev. Nancy went on a mission engagement vision trip with the WNC Conference Mission Engagement Team in October. She presented about this experience on October 29 and will again at Givens Estates Chapel service on November 12, 3PM.

We're hoping to share with you each month a little more information about the ZOE EMPOWERS program.

Our conference has partnered and adopted the Abadahigwa "Supreme" Bweramana Empowerment Group, from now through their graduation in June 2026. Nancy and the team were able to meet them as they have just begun their Zoe three year journey. The youth choose their own group name - our group choosing the name "Abadahigwa," meaning "supreme!". The first part of the name is their self-description and the second part is a reference to their location, Bweramana, so that we can distinguish between groups that choose the same name for themselves.

The following is the list of names for your specific group. In bold are heads of household, followed by their siblings and dependents. Although Zoe records both first and second names, we use only first names in public lists to preserve the privacy of children in the program. The ages of the orphaned and vulnerable children in the Zoe Empowers program range between infant and college age, however, the youth who is the head of household must be old enough to manage a small business and so is usually between 14 and 21 years old.

And a bonus: because our partnership pledge for this Rwanda group was made during the ZOE Imagine Campaign, funding is being provided by anonymous donors to support two 2023 groups in Vizag, India: Smart Stars and Talented Persons. This means an additional 45 families with 136 orphaned and vulnerable children are

receiving Zoe resources and training to transform their lives!

During the first meeting the youth elect leaders, make rules to guide their meetings, choose a group name, and decide when and where to hold weekly gatherings. The youth complete training on topics of food security, health and disease prevention, business management, and child rights within the first six months. If they have access to land they receive seeds to start gardens and plant crops. If siblings are not attending school, Zoe provides uniforms and other resources to get them back into classes. Children who have skills are provided start-up resources to begin their small businesses; others receive grants to start income projects or begin vocational training. To strengthen peer bonds, groups begin shared income activities or agricultural projects. They also begin "mutual help" activities which involve visiting each other's homes and working together on large tasks like farm preparation and harvesting; establishing kitchen gardens; and house/latrine cleaning, repair, or construction.

The Dream

One of the first tasks new members complete is the creation of their "Dream" chart. Most orphaned and vulnerable children entering the Zoe empowerment program face a daily struggle to survive; there is neither time to think about the future nor reason to hope for something better. But through Zoe and your partnership, the children learn to imagine a new life and prepare to make it a reality.

The Zoe program facilitator leads members through an exercise called the Dream process where they examine their current situation and then set their goals. After considering their family's hopes and needs, the youth who is considered the head of the household and is the primary member of their empowerment group creates a poster of responses to a standard set of questions:

- What makes you feel sad?
- What makes you happy?
- What happens in the community that you do not like?
- What is your dream for the future?
- What will be your guiding principles to achieve your dream?

This youth then presents the Dream to the rest of the group members who express support and give feedback, especially concerning the primary goal. These Dream documents help the program facilitators better understand the conditions of the children's lives so they can address specific needs or traumas suffered. The family keeps a copy of their Dream, often displaying it in their home to provide daily motivation as they strive to create their new life. As they progress through the empowerment program they will often update their Dream.

HAL FLETCHER STARNES, SR.
(19 OCT 1925 ~ 12 SEP 2023)



Hal Fletcher Starnes, Sr. passed away peacefully on September 12, 2023, 5 weeks shy of his 98th birthday.

Hal was preceded in death by his parents, O.E. Starnes, Sr. and Marion Fletcher Starnes, and by his wife and best friend of 67 years, Alberta Evans Starnes.

Hal is survived by his son, Hal F. Starnes Jr. (Elizabeth Valentine) and their four children Hal F. Starnes, III, Theresa, Ian and Valentine, his daughter Martha Caroline Douglas (Bill Douglas) and their two children Catherine and Will, and his son Andrew Starnes (Linda Wisler).

Hal grew up on Blue Ridge Ave. and in Malvern Hills, attending Vance Elementary, Hall Fletcher Junior High and Asheville High School, and the University of South Carolina graduating with a degree in Civil Engineering.

Hal enlisted in the Navy during WWII and worked on an aircraft carrier as his flat feet prohibited him from enlisting in the Army. He served 3 years and was honorably discharged as a Lieutenant JG when the war ended. Hal returned to Asheville and joined the Imperial Life Insurance Co. where he worked originating loans as part of the company's investment portfolio. He served as the company's Assistant Secretary and later as Assistant Vice President. He served in the same role after the company was purchased by Western & Southern Life Ins. Co.

When a promotion required a move to Ohio, Hal decided to stay in North Carolina and joined Wachovia Bank as a Vice President in the Mortgage Loan Dept where he worked for many years during which he moved his family to Winston-Salem to establish a Mortgage Loan department there.

Hal later moved back to Asheville and founded Blue Ridge Savings Bank where he served as President until his retirement. But golf was boring. So he got together with a friend and started developing mountain land. Hal did appraisals and arranged financing while his friend cleared land and built houses. They had a successful partnership for many years until Hal finally "retired" around age 80 when he and Alberta moved to Givens Estates where he took about every exercise class available.

Hal had a long association with Givens Estates where he was one of the founders and served as its second Treasurer. He was a long-term Board member having joined in 1979 but was never allowed to retire from that – when his final term was up, they made him a lifetime board member. Hal played a key role when Givens was

founded helping to secure funding to build the first housing units. He travelled to many of the region's United Methodist Church conferences soliciting donations and obtaining government funding to help build and support Givens' vision of a retirement community with ongoing health and nursing care. The Starnes Special Care wing is named for him.

After returning from WWII and starting work, Hal enjoyed activities and social events around West Asheville. One night while attending a square dance at the Malvern Hills pool and community center, he was smitten by a girl twirling around the dance floor amongst many suitors. All Hal needed to do was flash his blue eyes and she melted. They married in 1950 and had 67 years together.

Hal was raised in the Oak Forest Presbyterian church but moved to Trinity United Methodist on Haywood Rd after he married. He remained an active member there and in the Sprinkle-Bagwell Bible Class. At Trinity, he served as Chairman of the Council on Ministries, a Lay Leader and Sunday School Superintendent. He answered phones at the Crisis Help line when living in Winston-Salem. He served as Church Treasurer and after retiring from the bank, worked with Alberta delivering food with Meals on Wheels for many years.

Hal was a member of the American Institute of Real Estates Appraisers and the Western NC Builders Association. He served on the Asheville Board of Realtors, the City of Asheville Board of Adjustment and the Asheville Transit Authority.

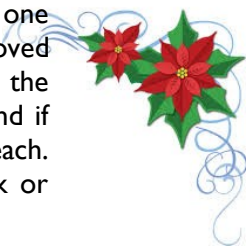
